# Reflections Of Life

Ralph Eugene Rhodes was born to Floyd Harvey and Pearl Earlene Rhodes on July 25, 1944 in Chickasha, OK. He was the third of five children. At an early age, Ralph accepted Christ and was baptized at Central Baptist Church in Lennox, CA. He was active in church, playing the accordion, a member of the church softball team, and he enjoyed his youth group. He grew up and attended school in Lawndale, CA, where he



participated in Track & Field and graduated from Lawndale High School, June 1962. He later attended trade school for Auto Paint & Body. Ralph's family returned to Oklahoma City in 1965. Ralph gave 31 years of service to Tinker Air Force Base as a civilian Tool & Dye Operator.

Ralph and Leola met years before they married and were close friends. They confessed Christ as the head of their lives as they united in marriage

on June 24, 1978, sharing 41 years together. The two of them affectionately called each other "Honey". They shared many laughs and built a blessed life together. But, if you ask them as a couple about their most prized gifts, they would tell you their children and grandchildren. Ralph enjoyed supporting his children and grandchildren in their activities, such as sports, cheer, and drill team – he was their #1 fan. The grandchildren affectionately call him Pa Pa. Pa Pa will always be known for the cool, strong, and loving guy that taught them how to check/change oil in a car, fish, ride a bike, garden, calculate math in their heads, use tools, and shoot a BB gun. He also took great pleasure in making all of the grandchildren a personal hand made wooden chair until he realized he would need to open a furniture store to keep up. He didn't know he would need to go into business.

Ralph was a jack of all trades. He also was blessed with an abundance of energy and strength. When God created him, He must have given him his own storage of kinetic energy. Even in his 70s he was still mowing and manicuring an acre of land, climbing the ladder to work on he and Leola's home, and tinkering on cars. His greatest enjoyment was restoring classic cars. The love of his life outside of Leola, was his beloved 1962 Corvette.

He was preceded in death by his grandparents, parents, his youngest brother Kerry Ray Rhodes, and his daughter Robin Rhodes Jackson.
