# Obituary

Thelma Reece Parks was born April 4, 1923 in Muskogee, Oklahoma to Thomas and Estelle Reece. The sixth of nine children, Thelma accepted Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior at a young age.

A natural leader, she excelled in her school work and graduated early from Manual Training High School. She enrolled at Langston University in 1942, where she was elected class secretary and graduated Cum Laude with a degree in Elementary Education in 1945. She later earned her Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling from the University of Oklahoma.

Wanting to enhance the lives of African American children in Muskogee, Mrs. Parks moved back to her hometown but was initially denied employment due to unfair hiring practices that existed against teachers of color. According to state law, she could not teach in the community without having experience in a rural area. Unwilling to accept the policies that were in place, a review was conducted by the State Board of Education and the Muskogee School System. Not only was Mrs. Parks hired to teach at Wheatley Elementary School, but the state requirements were also changed.

Looking for a new challenge, Mrs. Parks was hired at Dunbar Elementary School in Oklahoma City before taking a position at Truman Elementary School, which was one of the first integrated schools in the district.

In 1961, Dr. F. D. Moon hired her to be the first reading specialist at Douglass High School. By the end of her tenure, she would become the Chairman of the English Department.

Accepting a role outside the classroom, Mrs. Parks became the first African American Counselor at U. S. Grant High School in 1971, three years before any African American students were admitted. She later became the Director of Guidance and Counseling there before retiring in 1987.

Later that year she was elected to the Oklahoma City Public School Board of Education by the constituents in District 5 and was elected president in 1990. Knowing the value of an education, she was able to secure one of the largest bonds in Oklahoma City Public School history that lead to the construction of two new elementary schools. As a result of her leadership and dedication to the children of Oklahoma City, Thelma Reece Parks Elementary School was built in 1997.

In 1995, Mrs. Parks was a finalist for the prestigious Council of Great City Schools' Richard R. Green Award, given to a select group of board members from around the nation. She became the first African American from Oklahoma to serve on the National School Board Association's Board of Directors. In 2002, she was elected President of the National Black Caucus of School Board Members. And in April of 2015, she was initiated into the Oklahoma Women's Hall of Fame by then governor Mary Fallin.

Mrs. Parks has been inducted in the National Black College Alumni Hall of Fame in Atlanta, GA, and the Nu African American Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. She is a life member of the
